It was evident in the recent community survey that many of you have been experiencing issues with HERO, and as a school it is important that you connect with our communication systems. We have been in contact with HERO and there was a remedy to the app over the break; we would appreciate knowing of any further issues.

HERO is so good for the sharing of learning and reporting achievements, so we will keep on using it for this purpose, but we also know that the newsletter and

updates from teachers are vital to ensure you know what is going on and that you are connected to the school.

Therefore, after some consideration and a trial with members of the Board and selected PTA families, we have decided to commit to a new school app to ensure you can effectively and easily connect with

the school. School Apps is used by many of our local schools and comes highly recommended.


The benefits for you are as follows:

Building work over Term 4

We are just about to start some upgrading of various classrooms and facilities with Ministry of Education maintenance funding. Rooms 6 and 7 will be first off the block, along with the intermediate toilet block. Over the holidays the junior block will be re-roofed, along with changes to the staff toilet area upstairs.





Rooms 4 and 5 will be renovated over Term 1 next year. The classrooms will be renovated to a similar model as Rooms 1 and 2, with two separate classrooms being connected with a big glass sliding door allowing for greater flexibility of the two spaces. This means Room 6 and 7 will be relocating to the hall for the remainder of the term and the intermediate students will need to use the hall toilets or the outdoor toilets. There will also be a change to access to the office for the Year 0 - 2 classes as there will be restricted access to Rooms 6 and 7.

Whilst not a building change, we have decided to allocate two of the outdoor toilets to girls only, two to boys only and one toilet will be gender neutral. Despite the toilets being cleaned twice a day, there are often toilets being left in a state that means they are not able to be used until they are cleaned again.

Finally, it is great to see so many of you back in the playground at the end of the day. Don't forget the Trivia Night is coming up soon – it will be great to see lots of full tables there as we come together as a community to support the school. – *Catherine and Alison*






Thinking about thinking

Over the year, our teachers and students have been looking into tools and strategies to encourage more flexible ways to think. We know this is important because our students will probably encounter challenges in their lives and future careers that we have never seen before – their world will look quite different and we want to equip them with strategies they can use to make sense of it.

The model we are using focuses on five types of thinking: **Finding Information, Knowledge Comprehension, Analysis, Evaluation** and **Synthesis**. We have been exploring many tools to help us think in these ways. Here are some examples of the tools:

Improvements we have noticed are:

- Students find it easier to organise their ideas
- Ideas that students come up with are more focussed on why and how, rather than observations
- When we use these as a planning tool, there is more detail that students can draw on in their writing

Out-of-zone ballot

The closing date for out-of-zone applications will be Wednesday 14th October 2020. If you are out of zone with children currently at the school, you still need to apply for the out-of-zone ballot for any siblings who will be starting school next year.

Places are available for Years 0, 1, and 2 (Priority 2–6) and Years 3 and 5 (Priority 2 only).

KTS Kiwiana Trivia Night


This much anticipated event is back on! The Covid lockdown in August forced its postponement - but the new date of Saturday 7th November has been set.
