
Guidance from the MOE highlights that if you need to have your child cared for by someone else, you will need to identify that person or people as part of your self-isolated group. This will need to be done by midnight Wednesday and the group must remain the same for the whole 4-week period. Your group (your partner, children, parents or such) become one group. This group needs to be limited to minimise any risk of spread and should be no more than 20 people.

Your child will be looking to you for guidance about this decision. Parents, caregivers, whānau and teachers will have a particularly important part to play in reassuring children at this time. If you haven't already done so, you may wish to read the information put together by the Ministry of Education to support your conversations with your children – <u>Talking to children about COVID-19</u>

<u>HERO</u>

We have opened up the "celebration of learning" section of HERO as planned yesterday. If you look at Gavin's profile (pictured right) you can see he has two posts as a Year 7 student.

In this section you will see celebrations of learning for the whole class along with individual posts (much like SeeSaw). You have the ability to comment as well. As we move into this new learning mode, teachers and students will be celebrating learning success in this area of the programme.



Distance Learning

From Wednesday, teachers will be supporting learning. This week it is a little more generic. We wanted to ensure 3-Way Learning Conferences were completed before ensuring ready access, particularly for the younger students – clearly this has not happened for all. Teachers will send out instructions to those who need it, on how to set this up at home.

The Year 4–8 classes will be using Google Classroom or Google Docs. All students will know how to access these if they were at school the last few days. In some classes this was covered on Monday but there were a number of students away. If this was the case for you, the classroom teachers will be in touch with instructions.

The Year 2 and 3 classes will be using Google Docs and teachers will send emails about learning to you. Students have log-in addresses for Google now, with passwords set up yesterday. If your child was absent this week, their teacher will help you get set up with this. Email for these junior students is not activated, the log-in is designed to provide access to shared docs for learning.

The Year 1 students will be supported through emails directly to you, their parents.

We recognise that for some families with more than one or two students, screen time will be an issue. Teachers will be sending through ideas and suggestions for "unplugged learning" as well as "plugged". Again, check the <u>learning at home page</u> on the website as we have offline learning ideas. It is certainly going to be a time to be creative.

We also recommend you ensure students have time during their learning day to be working on independent tasks – creating lego, or making a character or scene from their book, creating a dance to their favourite piece of music to perform to the family later on. This does not have to be full on, one-on-one learning for 5 hours a day according to a timetable; be flexible and have fun. We will keep drip feeding ideas through HERO, Google Docs or Google Classroom.

School Holidays

School holidays have been brought forward so that they are completed within the 4-week period. Holidays will now begin from **Monday 30 March to Tuesday 14 April inclusive.** At the end of the school holidays, schools will be open for distance learning with teachers supporting learning from their home until schools are able to open again.
