Routines

Children are allowed into the classroom at 8.30am. At this time the children are expected to get themselves ready for the day ahead.

They may also play outside until the 8.50am bell rings.

Children are expected to arrive at school by 8.45am, enabling them to be seated in class, ready and equipped for learning when the 8.50am bell indicates the start of the school day.

If you arrive after 8.50am please check in at the school office before coming to class.

Day to day

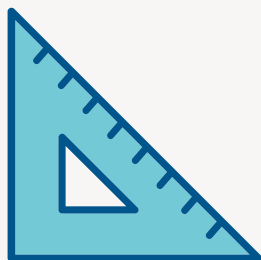
Home Learning

Home learning is a useful way to establish a positive home – school partnership. It is a valuable tool for opening communication with your child about what is happening at school.

Home Learning is set each fortnight. It will be collected on a Friday and your child will receive feedback on their efforts. Homework will be given out and glued into students books on a Monday.

Reading

The more your child reads, the better they get! Reading at home every day is a great way to help children learn to love books, as they read for enjoyment as well as knowledge. In Year 4 the children do not bring 'readers' home in a book bag every day. They will be bringing home books from the school library that they have chosen to read for pleasure. The books they read at Literacy time are kept at school as they take more than one session to read then complete followup activities that consolidate the learning intention.



Writing

The writing programme teaches skills that can be applied across the curriculum. Some examples are recounts, narrative, report writing, persuasion, notetaking, presentations.

Spelling

Lists will be sent home weekly. Spelling will be tested every Friday so children need to bring their spelling notebooks every Friday. Please support your child to apply these words in different contexts. It is important that children learn the spelling patterns and rules so that they can be applied to a range of words. They also need to be able to demonstrate an understanding of the meaning of words by writing/using unknown words in a sentence.

Maths

For children to be able to tackle more complex mathematical problems, generally, they will need to have instant recall of the basic facts. Family of facts sheets and Mathletics are valuable tools for learning the basic facts at home.

Inquiry.

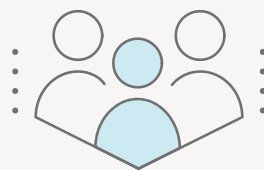
A big part of using the skills we teach goes into our inquiry. Students have the opportunity to learn about each other, our families, our cultures, our past, our world. Not all inquiry outcomes will be the same giving the students a variety of ways to see how information can be displayed or presented.

Children's School Email Address

Library

Room 10 - Monday after morning tea Room 11 - Wednesday after morning tea.
Each week we go to the school Library. This is a chance for students to find a quiet space in the library with a book and check out what new ones are available as advertised by our wonderful librarian Jane. Students can take out 2 books, 1 to take home.



Fitness/PE/Sports

Most mornings we complete some sort of fitness. Skills based lessons are taught on Wednesday mornings and games where children can practice their skills are played on Friday afternoon.

Camp

The Year 4 Marae visit and overnight stay at school will happen in term 4 again this year. This is always noted as a highlight of the year by our Year 4 students. More information will come out about this later.

Behaviour

Every year children consider what it means to be a learner at Kohia Terrace School. Together we have developed class treaties. We have all agreed to the terms of each class treaty. The students are encouraged to respect themselves, those around them, their environment and their belongings in accordance with the Kohia Code.
